Minutes

Meeting called to order by CAC Chair Luis Nieves-Ruiz at 5:01 PM

Pledge of Allegiance and Confirmation of Quorum

- Quorum reached with six board members in attendance.
- March 2023 meeting minutes were unanimously approved.

Announcements: Chairman's Remarks

No updates provided.

Public Comment:

• Mr. Tom Connolly introduced himself and stated his concern regarding the lack of ridership and the costs associated with operating SunRail, and it continues to not attract enough residents to use the system. He specified it's costing federal, state, and county taxpayers about \$50M a year to run SunRail for roughly 2000 residents. He is concerned about the burden taxpayers will have to subsidize SunRail in the long term. Mr. Connolly feels that there isn't anything driving up ridership and therefore something needs to be reconsidered or reevaluated since taxpayers will find it very difficult to accept. Mr. Connolly provided a document that summarizes his concerns.

 - SunRail partnered again with Track Shack to allow riders to travel for free, wearing their bib number, to and from the Simply IOA Corporate 5k race at Lake Eola
 - Over 1,000 racers took SunRail to and from Church Street Station
 - Extra 9:15pm northbound train supported everyone going home from event
 - Excitement earned media coverage that promoted riding SunRail
- Group Sales Growth

- o Group rides are on the rise
 - Over 2,000 riders so far this year
 - Several groups scheduled for summer
 - Increasingly popular with special needs schools who teach the importance of public transportation and rail safety to their students
- Phase 2 North Deland Construction Updates
 - o Grade crossing improvements continue at Old New York Ave in anticipation of station construction
 - o Clearing and site work for the Deland Station is progressing
- SunRail Recovery from Hurricane Ian Damage Drainage Improvements in Osceola County
 - o Photos were shown of updated work in progress.
 - o South of Garden St into Poinciana, work being completed from prior washout.
 - o New culverts have been installed.
 - Mr. Spears was trying to understand the flooding issue and asked if it was a result of the track being set at too low of an elevation or was it because there was a lack of capacity to drain the excess water from the storm?
 - Mr. Carman explained it was not due to the rail being too low, it was due to the large capacity to run that amount of water that resulted from the storms.
 - Mr. Spears clarified, the water flowed over the rail because of the large amount of water that came down in the area, and the drainage improvements would be expected to correct the flooding concerns in the future.
 - Mr. Carman confirmed.

Lynx Connectivity

- Phase 1 Feeder Route Service and Average Daily Boardings
 - o In April 2023, bus ridership went up 18% compared to April of last year and up 10% when compared with this May as compared to May 2022.

- Seeing an overall increase from last year.
- Phase 2 South Feeder Bus Routes
 - o April showed increases in all fixed routes and one of the Neighborlink routes did have a decrease in ridership.
 - o May showed all fixed routes with increases in ridership when compared to last year.
 - Mr. Nieves-Ruiz asked where the Lynx Route 18 goes through.
 - Mr. Detweiler explained the route starts at the Kissimmee Station and goes through Buena Ventura Lakes and continues to the Meadow Woods Station, then travels up South Orange Ave. to terminate at Lynx Central Station.
 - Mr. Spears asked if figures with ridership were given for both Lynx and SunRail.
 - Mr. Detweiler clarified the numbers provided were only for Lynx.
 - Mr. Spears asked what the relation between ridership and the expanded population was. He wasn't sure if the numbers were up due to expanded population or if it was because public transportation was becoming more popular?
 - Mr. Detweiler explained that overall, there has been an increase in ridership year over year since COVID. He feels that plays a lot into it. As tourism is improving in the area, LYNX is also seeing an uptick in ridership in those areas.
 - Mr. Nieves-Ruiz confirmed that he has also seen the routes are increasing in the areas where there is more to do for tourists.

Votran Connectivity

• Over the past several months, average daily ridership holding steady. About 2% lower when compared to last year, around 20 riders are using Votran to and from SunRail daily.

Sunshine Corridor Update

- FDOT Transit Concept and Alternatives Review (TCAR)
 - o Defines the purpose and need of the project
 - o Analyzes alternatives for potential solutions
 - o Defines and documents requirements

 - Mr. Rosario asked if the study was completed, speaking of the TCAR?
 - Mr. Stanger explained that it just started.
 - Mr. Spears said that the Sunshine Corridor just came up to the Orange County Planning Department and was approved to move forward and was going to the County Commission to be included in the next update of the County's Comprehensive Plan. He voiced a concern about the alignment from OIA to I-Ddrive not hitting a SunRail station. Mr Spears said if there isn't connectivity between those two routes (Sunshine Corridor and SunRail), they aren't really useful to the public. He doesn't believe that providing a bus to connect the two routes is sufficient. This would mean adding trip time and it isn't convenient or useful unless there is a station where people can transfer directly from the west route to the east route.

Committee Member Comments

- Mr. Nieves-Ruiz asked if the study was being done in-house or if there was a consultant.
- Mr. Stanger confirmed a consultant is being used for the TCAR study.
- Mr. Nieves-Ruiz asked if the MOU was with all the local funding partners.
- Mr. Stanger confirmed.
- Mr. Spears asked who Orlando's Right Rail was.
- Mr. Stanger stated he would get a more defined answer for the next meeting.
- Mr. Nieves-Ruiz addressed the comments Mr. Connolly made and said he understood where he was coming from and values public comments. As a rider for the last six years, he sees the opportunities that it brings. He also lives right in front of I-4, where \$7.6 Billion dollars was spent and still sees congestion. Even though public transportation does not show a return on investment, we need to rethink how we are moving our people. That's where SunRail comes in. We are not at a perfect stage but are comparable to other systems. Most other transit systems across the country have seen a decline because of COVID and a lot of people now working from home. Unsure if that trend will continue.
- Mr. Spears shares the cost concerns of Mr. Connolly but also thinks that we must keep in mind that there is no mode of transportation that will turn a profit in America. Airlines may do so, but are also heavily subsidized. Highways, less than 10% is actually paid for by fees. We need to get away from the idea that transportation is profitable. We do it because it is necessary. But, we do need to do it more efficiently.
- Mr. Connolly rebutted he doesn't feel it needs to be profitable. The cost is just too high per citizen. Spoke to the anomaly of ridership in March due to the Saturday service and events happening in the area. SunRail is in it's ninth year. He would love to see a lot of people using SunRail.
- Mr. Nieves-Ruiz stated that part of the reason we are committee members is because we believe in rail. Public transportation is important, hopes more people are willing to come in with public comments, and hopefully we can prove to be a benefit to the public.

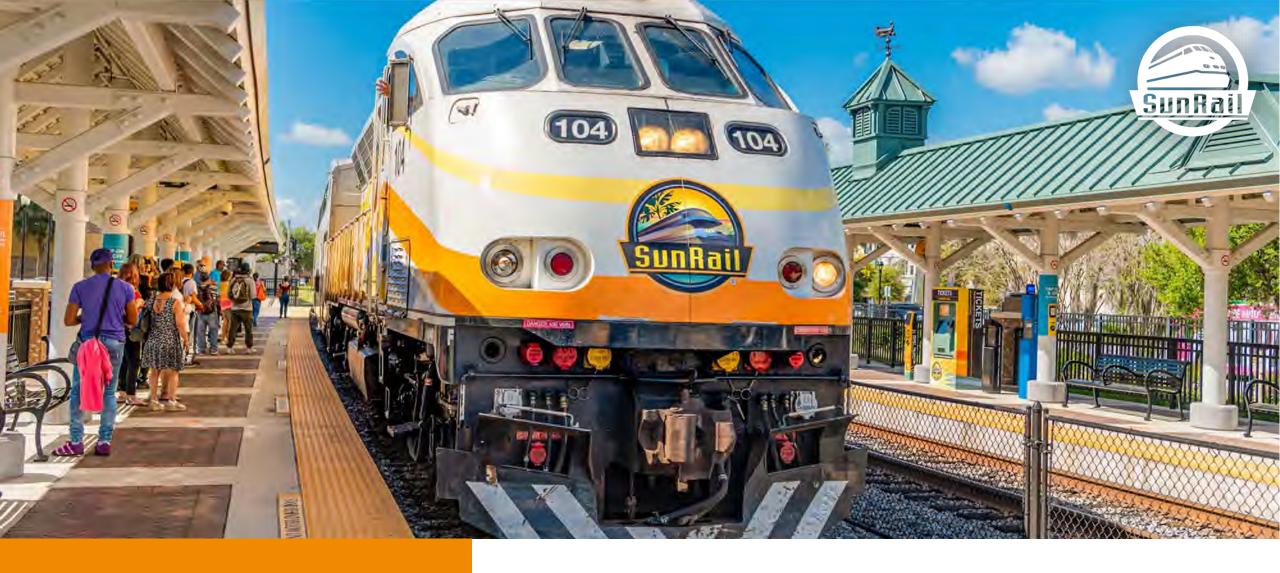

- Community was fully informed throughout the process through media releases, online/app updates, and social media









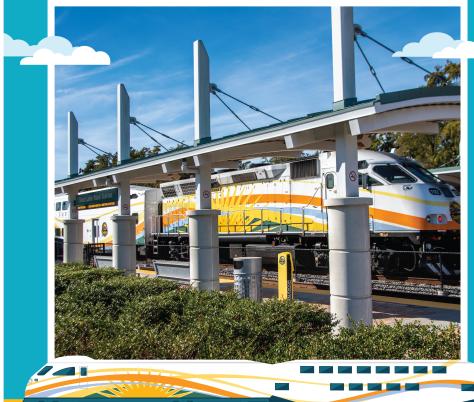
NEW AND IMPROVED TRAIN TO PLANE

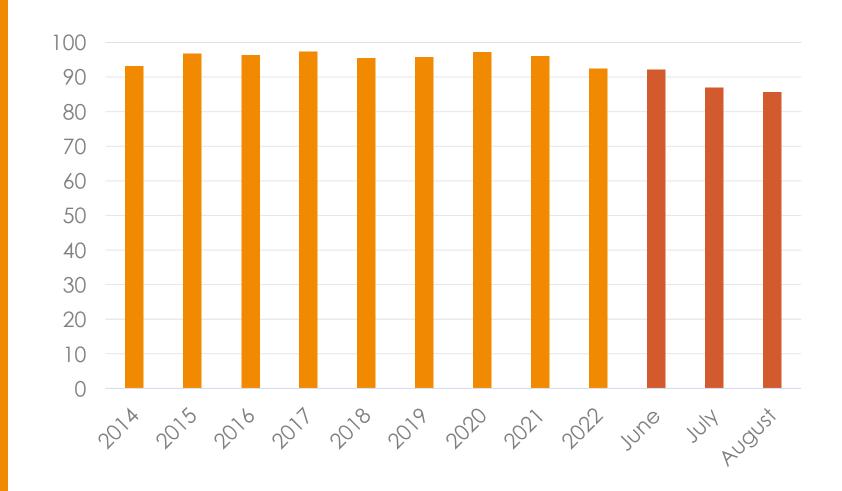

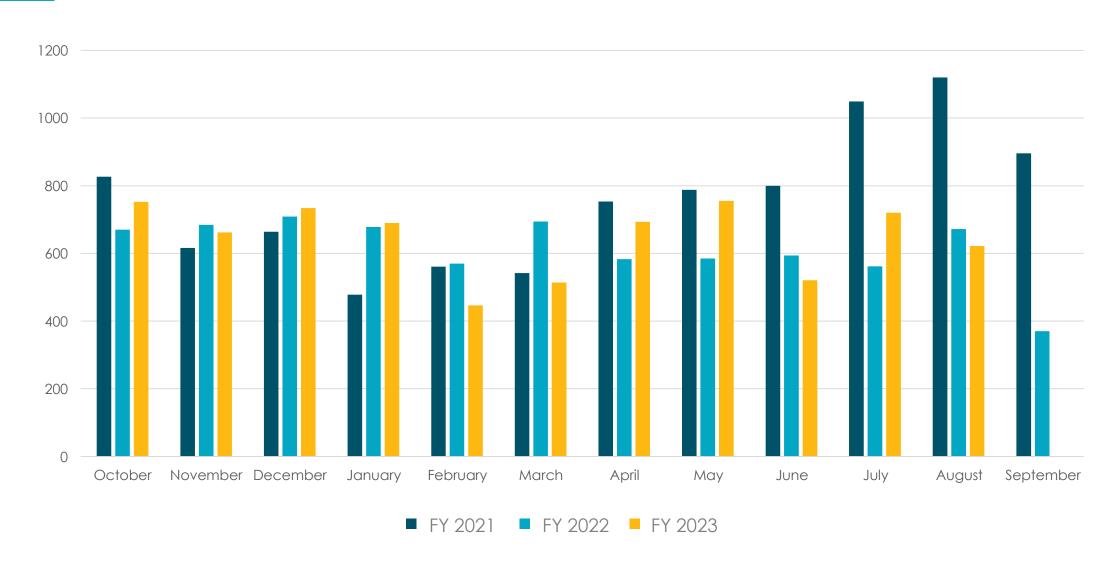

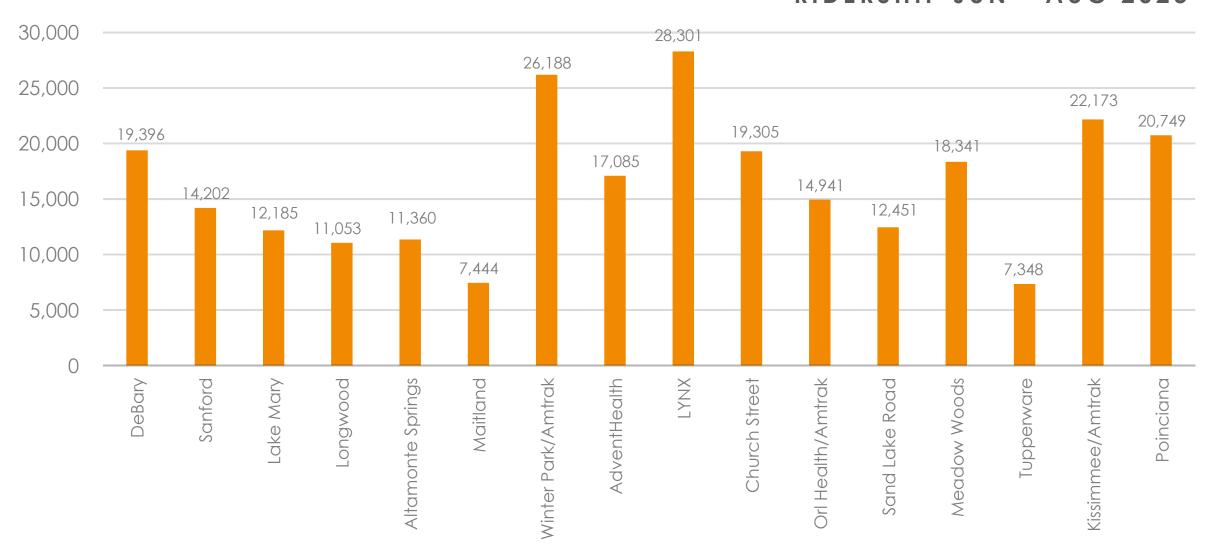

BOARDING BY STATION

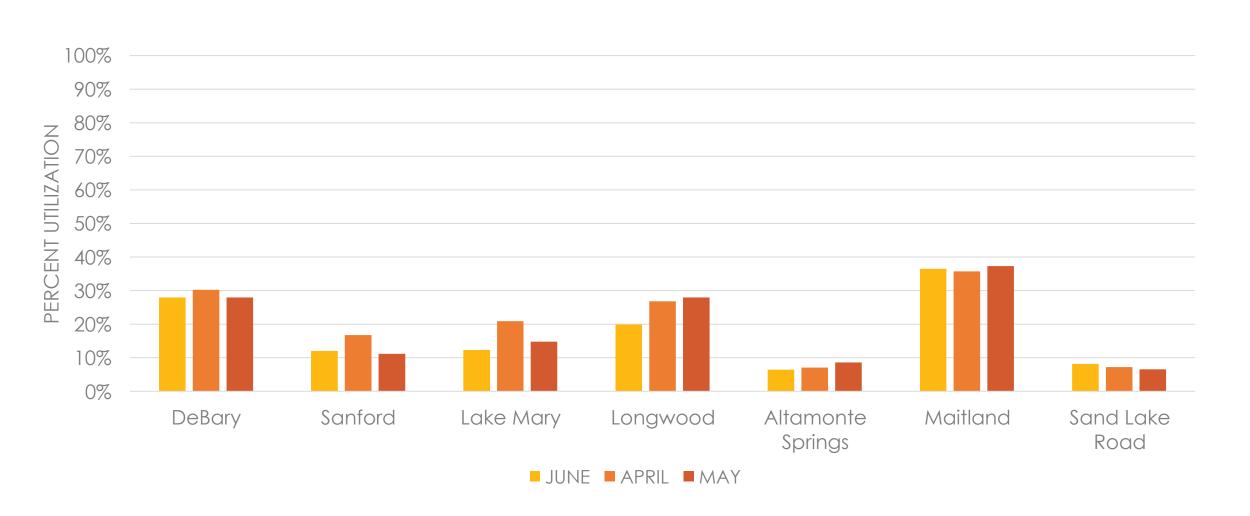
RIDERSHIP JUN - AUG 2023





IOS STATION PARKING

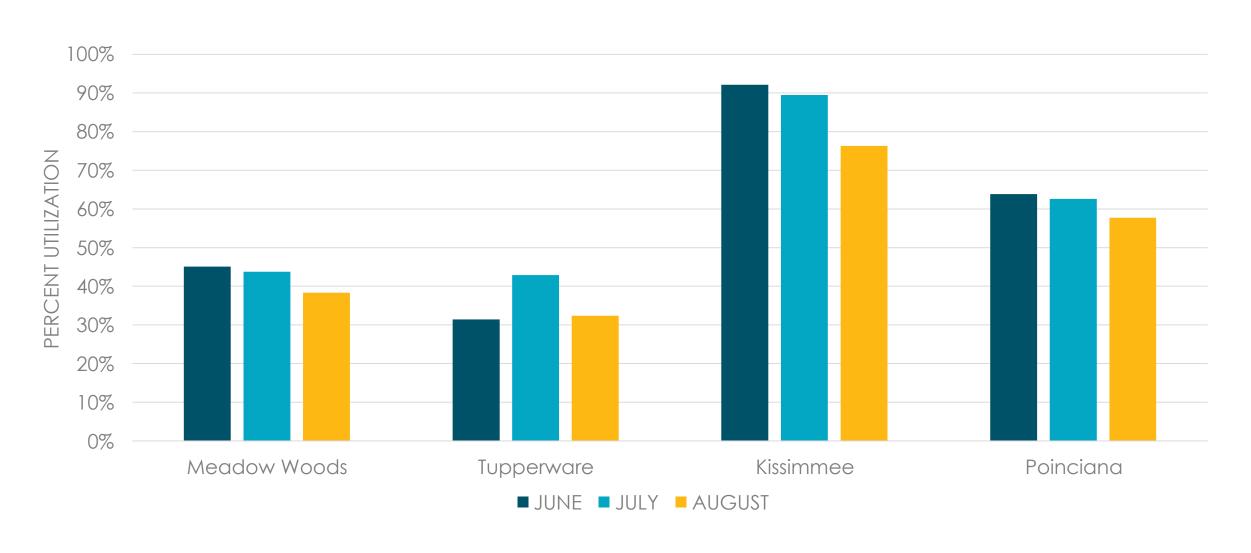

SOUTHERN EXPANSION STATION PARKING

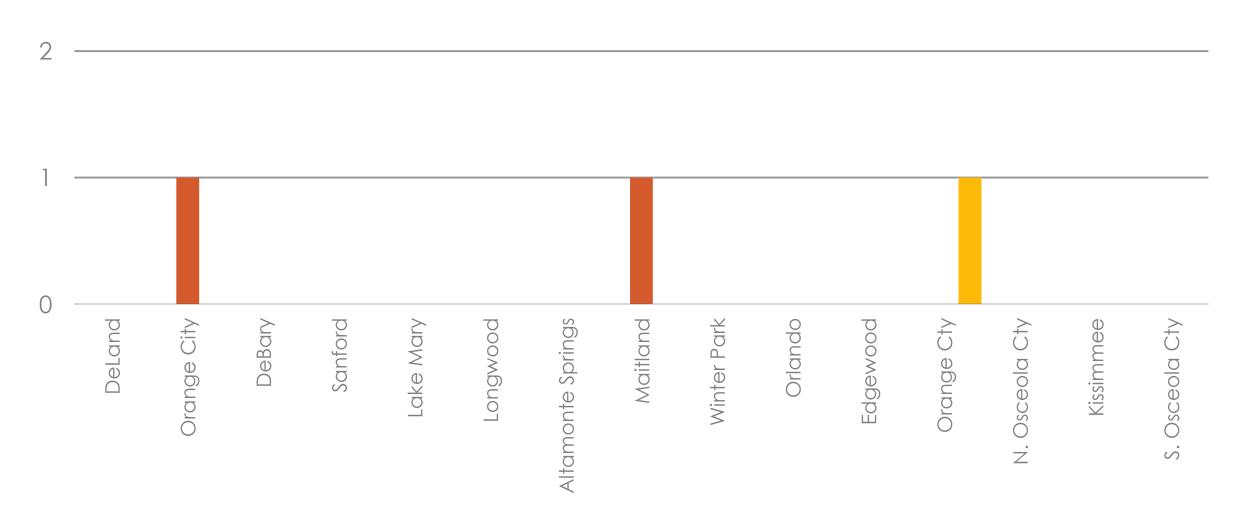

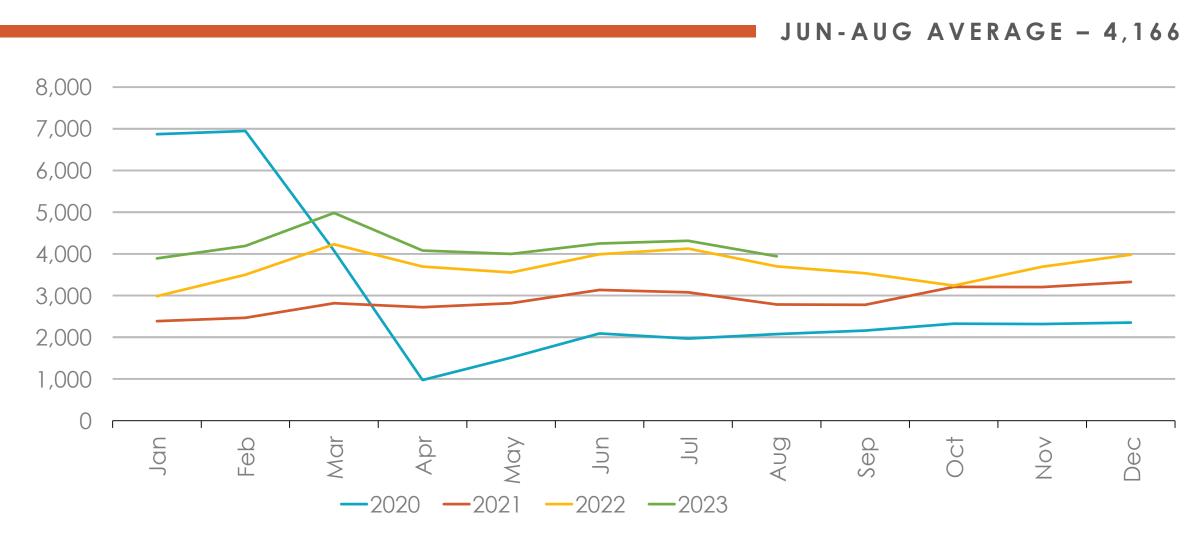

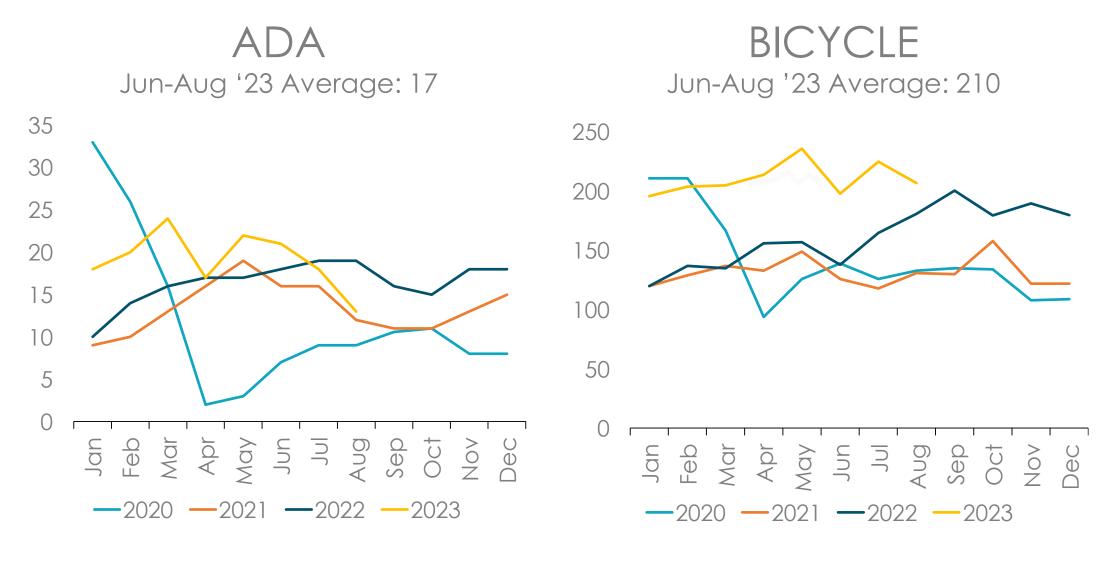


AVERAGE DAILY RIDERSHIP





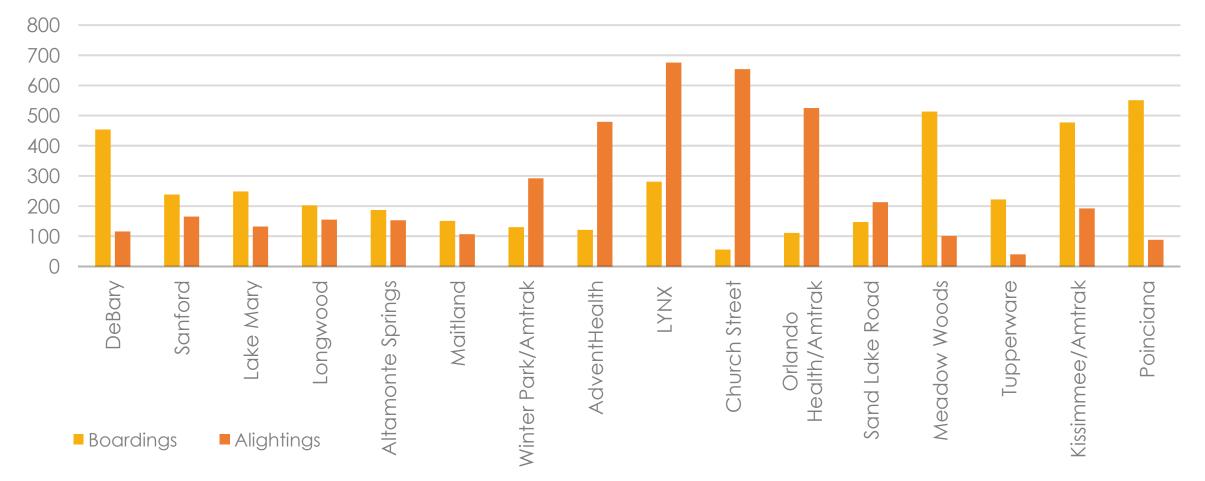
